Good communication and language skills lead to happy, confident children who are good talkers.


Good talkers make GREAT learners

The best thing is, you don't have to do or buy anything special to help develop their language and communication skills.

All they really need is YOU!

Everytime you talk to your child it builds connections in their brain.

The more you talk the stronger these connections grow, and the easier time they'll have thinking, talking and learning.



Even just 5 minutes spent on one of the simple activities in this book will make a difference.

# Words to use when helping



Children need to hear a new word lots of times before they start using it themselves. Using the word lots of times in different situations will support your child's language development.

#### Did you know?

It is important for your child to learn a variety of word types in order to talk in short sentences. Getting your child involved with simple jobs around the house gives you the chance to talk and interact as your child hears lots of different works.

## Everyday talk

Household jobs can be great for starting a conversation with your child. By chatting and interacting with them, you might even make these jobs fun for you. Don't forget to use a variety different words.

It can be hard to know which words will be the most useful for your child to hear.


Try watching them and thinking

'What would they say if they could?'

"You did a great job of mopping the floor. It's so clean it is sparkling."

"We need to find the matching pairs of socks. Shall we find the stripey socks or the spotty socks?"





#### Remember

Using different words, lots of times, in different situations, will support your child's language development.



## Talk and play

## Let's have a tea party

Encourage your child to invite you and a few of their toys to a' tea party'. Support them to count how many are coming and think about what they will need. Let them lay the table ready for the party. This will help them to learn the skills to lay the table for the family.

When the party is over give your child the responsibility of cleaning up. Let them wash the dishes in a bowl of soapy water, clean the table with a cloth and brush the floor with a dustpan and brush. Use lots of action words to describe what they are doing. "You're doing a great job of scrubbing the plates clean."



Have fun and enjoy the party together. Talk about what you are doing as you do it.
"I'm thirsty, I'm going to pour a cup of tea"

Pretend play is a great time to introduce more specific words.

"Mmmm my cake was delicious"



Helping you with jobs at home can support your childs understanding of following instructions and prepares your child to complete more complex tasks at school and other environments.

Lots of books have video versions on YouTube


Books really help your child to learn new words.

#### Top Tip

Take the time to pause and help your child understand what a few new words mean - you can point to the picture, give them a word that means the same thing or give an example of the word from their own experiences.

Remember to praise your child for looking, listening and sharing a story with you.

# TOP TIPS





F	Face to face	When you are face to face with your child, it shows you are listening and ready to interact.
A	Attention	Make sure you have your child's attention. Try saying their name first to gain their attention.
S	See what interests them	Follow your child's lead as they show you what they are interested in.
T	Time to respond	Children need time to put their thoughts together before they respond, so give them time.
C	Comment	Make comments and reduce the number of questions you ask, as comments lead to more talking.
A	Add to what they say	Build on what your child says by adding a word (e.g. child says "car", you say "shiny car").
R	Repeat	Children need to hear new words lots of times in different situations, so repeat, repeat!
S	Say it back to them	If your child says something incorrectly, say it back to them the right way (e.g.

"yes, it's a CAR!")


